



## **GRADE 8s REMINISCE ABOUT THE PLAGUE**

The Grade 8s completed a "Black Death" journal for Social Studies in October. The assignment is based on understanding the impact of the bubonic plague that killed up to half of all Europeans, near the beginning of the Renaissance. This project focused on a fictional character living during this time, along with some of his or her journal entries. The students were asked to consider how a society's worldview can change, when faced with a catastrophic event. After completing the written portions, the journals were stained and scorched to make them appear like old artifacts. The students worked hard and demonstrated great attitudes during this project!



## WHEN IS YOUR CHILD TOO SICK FOR SCHOOL?

With the return to school, one of the ways parents can keep their sanity and make their kids happy is to establish routines. One of the more important routines is to get your student in the habit of coming to school each and every day. Good school attendance is linked with higher grades, better social contact, better physical and mental health, and higher income after graduation.

One of the questions parents struggle with is when is my child too sick for school?

#### Send me to school if:

- I have a runny nose or just a little cough, but no other symptoms.
- I haven't taken any fever reducing medicine for 24 hours, and I haven't had a fever during that time.
- I haven't thrown up or had diarrhea for 24 hours.
- If I can drink fluids and my fever is below 100 degrees Fahrenheit (37.8° C).
- If my eyes are only slightly pink and the discharge is clear or watery.
- If I have a sore throat accompanied by a runny nose. This is often just due to simple irrita-

tion from the draining mucus.

 If I have a stomach ache and it is my only symptom. It could signal constipation or even a case of nerves.

#### Keep me home if:

- I have a temperate higher than 100 degrees Fahrenheit (37.8° C) – even after taking medicine.
- I am throwing up or have diarrhea.
- My eyes are pink and crusty.

#### Call the doctor if:

- I have a temperature higher than 100 degrees Fahrenheit (37.8° C) for more than two days.
- I have been throwing up and having diarrhea for more than two days.
- I had the sniffles for more than a week, or they aren't getting better.
- I still have asthma symptoms after using my asthma medicine.

## **BOOMERANG & WASTE FREE LUNCHES**

Indus School is continuing with Boomerang and Waste Free Lunches! Waste-free and *boomerang* lunch enable parents to see what their children are actually eating during the day.

Waste audits carried out at schools consistently find that a significant amount of this waste is made up of unopened packaged foods, uneaten fruit, full juice boxes, etc. Uneaten fruit that is added to the school waste can become a wasp hazard, especially in the fall. For some schools in Rocky View organic waste can be returned home and added to the "green bin", their city's organics waste program.

**Waste-free lunch/snack -** contains no throwaway packaging and produces no food waste. Food and drinks are packed in reusable containers within a reusable lunch bag.

**Boomerang lunch/snack** means that any uneaten food and any waste material produced is returned home. For sanitary purposes, it is important that food and waste packaging be taken home in a resealable container or bag.

#### **TIPS & TRICKS**

- Get children to help pack their lunches with healthy foods.
- Only pack as much food as your child will eat.
- Use a reusable lunch bag/box for carrying a lunch.
- Use a refillable bottle for drinks
- If you choose to use a single-serving container, please make sure it is recyclable.
- Put sandwiches, muffins, etc. in reusable containers, instead of plastic bags. Label them with your child's name so they have a better chance of coming home.
- Put cloth napkins in lunch boxes
- Cut fruit and vegetables into pieces so that some can be eaten at lunch and the rest saved for a later snack.
- Minimize the morning rush (when you'll reach for convenience, over-packaged items) and pack lunches the night before and refrigerate overnight.

#### PROVINCIAL ACHIEVEMENT TEST RESULTS

Every May and June, students in Grades 6 & 9 write Provincial Achievement Tests in the core subjects: ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies. The results from these tests are published in our School Annual Results Report, which will be available on our website later this month. Below is a summary of the P.A.T. results from last spring. While the Grade 6 results fluctuate from weak in Social Studies, to average in ELA, the Grade 9 results are very strong, particularly in Math and Science. Great work everyone!






## **ADMAZING \$AVINGS COUPON BOOKS**


#### **INDUS SCHOOL GOES TO WE DAY!**


