## Provincial Achievement Test Results

Across Alberta each spring, Students in grades 3, 6 \& 9 write the Provincial Achievement Tests. These tests are designed to determine how well students are meeting provincial learning expectations, to report that information to all Albertans, and to assist schools, divisions, and the province in monitoring, and hence improving, student learning. The Grade 3 results reflect on all the learning that has
taken place from Kindergarten to Grade 3, while the Grade 6 results profile everything the students have learned from Kindergarten through Grade 6.

Indus School students were generally on par with the rest of the province in meeting the acceptable standard. We did fall down a bit in the number of students meeting the standard of excellence in some subject
areas. The staff is anticipating that our study of differentiated instruction will help us find ways to ensure that all students are meeting the acceptable achievement levels, as well as increasing the number who are excelling.
The table below outlines the percentage of students who wrote the tests and achieved the Acceptable Standard and the Standard of Excellence.

We attended a two-day workshop in October with Damien Cooper on Assessment for Learning. This focused on using assessment as a tool to enhance learning. Mr. Cooper compared the teacher to a coach who gives his/her players many practices (assignments, tasks
etc.) before the big game (test). The practices don't count in the overall standings, only the games. When you look at learning this way, the students are more involved, responsive and successful.
