## KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION OPEN

Just a reminder that if you have a child who will be attending Kindergarten for the 2009-2010 school year, you can now come to the school to register between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:30
p.m., Monday through Thursday, and between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. on Fridays.

Your child must turn five years of age on or before the last day of February 2010. Please bring with
you a copy of the child's birth certificate. School registration fees for next year have not yet been determined by Rocky View Schools.

## SCHOOL AND TRANSPORTATION FEE WAIVERS

Beginning January 2009, Rocky View parents/guardians who receive the Goods and Services Tax Credit from the Government of Canada, will be eligible to have their child's student fees or transportation fees waived.

The Board of Trustees amended its fee waiver procedures October 16, 2008. Previously, fee waivers were based on Alberta Health Care Insurance waivers. With the elimination of Alberta Health Care premiums on January 1, 2009, a new standard was
required on which to base RVS fee waivers.
