MESSAGE FROM SCHOOL NURSE

Dressing for the Winter Weather

Although the weather outside can be cold, windy and wet, dressing appropriately can help you enjoy the frosty air. Try these tips for staying warm and dry while being active during the winter months.

Dress in layers. The inner layer of clothing should be made of material that will remove any moisture and keep it away from your skin. The middle layer is for warmth, and the outer layer should keep you dry and protected from the wind and water.

While it may be tempting to wear many pairs of socks, it's important to allow

enough space for your feet to fit comfortably inside the boots or skates. Socks or boots that are too tight may reduce circulation to your toes, making them feel cold. Socks made of material that removes moisture (choose a wool blend over cotton) help keep the feet dry.

A great deal of heat is lost through the head and neck. Be sure to wear a hat that covers the ears.

Consider a neck warmer instead of a scarf to reduce the risk of injury when being active.

A warm pair of mittens or gloves with a windproof shell is best for keeping your

fingers warm in the winter. Gloves provide better dexterity and mittens provide more warmth. Choose what's right for you.

Winter fun is all about staying dry. Wear the gear that will allow you to focus on the activity and forget about the cold. Adjust layers of clothing as needed before you start to sweat and change into dry clothes at your first opportunity.

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
GRADE 2: MAGNET MADNESS

SAFETY AT SCHOOL

You may have heard in the news last week about a school on Crowfoot Trail that had an intruder enter and perform indecent acts prior to fleeing. Shivers go up our spines when we hear about such incidents, and I'm sure many of you wonder what provisions we have in place at Indus School to avoid similar incidents.

Safety of students is our first priority. We attempt to keep our safety measures as low-key as possible without sacrificing effectiveness. We do this because we do not want children to grow up with the belief that everyone is evil and that they should live in fear of "the big bad world." We attempt to impart the lesson that necessary materials from home, then

living safely is vital, but living in fear is counterproductive.

Our first line of safety is our location; being relatively isolated and having vigilant neighbours protects us from most random intrusions. The next line of safety is having locked doors; the only door that is unlocked during class time is the main entrance (the other doors are opened to allow students to enter before school and at recesses). Our final, and most effective, measure in keeping unwanted visitors out (except for the odd garter snake and mice, but we do get them eventually) is our sense of community. To enter our school unobserved is extremely difficult, and most faces are familiar to staff members. Those people which whom staff members are not familiar are observed and either approached and greeted directly or reported to the office, after which the Principal or designate will approach and greet the person. Sorry to anyone we have made to feel uncomfortable with this practice, but better safe than sorry.

In the case that there is an intruder in the school or on the school grounds, staff members have a protocol to follow and students conduct "lockdown drills" twice every year.


