Grade 7 students have begun learning how to tell the history of Canada in 90 seconds. Have you ever been amazed at how few young adults know what the Holocaust is? Well, here at Indus School, Grade 7 students know because they have been reading a novel entitled, Daniel's Story. This amazing novel describes the journey of one young Jewish boy who is
watching the Holocaust unfold before him. He remembers each step of his journey through pictures, both actual photographs and those within his mind. Students have begun to integrate this story with Philosophy for Children discussions as they discuss how we know when an act is right or wrong. It is not always as simple as following rules.

## GRADE 2 - BOATS AND BUOYANCY

This month we have been very busy in Grade 2! We are studying Boats and Buoyancy in Science, and we are conducting different experiments to enhance our learning. We are constructing our own boats using a variety of materials, and we are learning what makes things sink and float.

In writing, we are beginning to write outlines of fictional stories, and the creativity in Grade 2 is amazing! We are also using many of these same writing strategies to increase our reading comprehension in many fictional books that we read.

In Math, the students have worked very hard at applying the different methods learned to adding and subtracting double-digit numbers. They are developing the ability to do more mental math and think critically about the problems that they are given.

## LITERACY AND NUMERACY CENTRES IN KINDERGARTEN

Literacy centres make words, letters, numbers, sounds, writing, and reading fun! In Kindergarten, centres are used to actively engage children in literacy and numeracy. Through self-directed activities students develop a sense of autonomy and are highly motivated through their own curiosity to observe, explore, discover, create, investigate and experiment with math and language. Centres give children a chance to reinforce their learning while practicing intellectual skills from all levels of Bloom's sort, match, order, clas-
sify and construct using magnetic letters and numbers, wooden shapes and blocks, plastercine and play dough. Students enjoy dressing up as a word detective with clip boards, hats and pointers on a quest for

words to read or write. They compose, create, and design a card for Mommy or a friend. They apply their learning through card games such as A/phabet Go Fish, Memory or
and reading using the computer, or Leap Frog. Some students prefer hands on activities such as making patterned necklaces, which improves fine motor development. Centres reach the different learning styles in the classroom with our Hop Scotch appealing to the kinesthetic learner, while the interpersonal learner is drawn to surveying classmates and then graphing the results. Oral language expression is developed as the children tell stories and sing nursery rhymes using felt board characters and puppets. Centres challenge students at varying academic levels, interests and learning styles and provide the opportunity to try something new. For some students, the best part is having the chance to make their own choices and then sharing what they have learned with the rest of the group.

## THE BACKPACK DILEMMA: FUNCTION VS. FASHION

The following excerpts are taken from Dynamic ChiropracticSeptember 1, 2005, Vol. 23, Issue 18

Chiropractors, pediatricians and orthopedic surgeons alike agree that backpacks are a problem for a child's spine. While a backpack alone may not cause major problems, overloading and improper carrying of a backpack can lead to headaches, neck, shoulder, and lower back pain.

How heavy is too heavy? Do your parent patients know that their 60 pound child should be limited to carrying no more than 9 pounds; the 80 pound child, 12 pounds; and the 100 pound preadolescent, no more than 15 pounds?

How can parents lighten the load? It is important to have parents weigh their child's backpack at least once a week. If it exceeds the " 15 percent" rule of their child's weight, the parents should be encouraged to work with their child to evaluate his or her backpack and determine how to "lighten the load."
Proper loading and carrying. The heaviest items should rest against the back, which means loading them first and attempting to distribute the weight evenly. The only proper way to carry a backpack is with both straps over the shoulders and the backpack resting against the lower back.

Function vs Fashion. Encourage parents to meet a few criteria when choosing a better functional backpack: First, that the backpack fit
properly (not too long or too short); and second, that it have wide, padded, adjustable straps (for proper positioning on the back). A third option is to look for a backpack with a hip strap or lumbar pillow. When shopping, parents should consider that the more support features on the backpack they buy, the less spinal stress their child will carry.
Are roller bags the solution? Although one might think that the roller bag would be the answer to the problem...it should be noted that an empty roller bag may weight up to 80 percent more than an empty backpack. Furthermore, these bags run larger, inviting the owner to overload the extra space as much as 50 pounds.

## * IMPORTANT * SCHOOL BUS INFORMATION FOR <br> 2010 - 2011 SCHOOL YEAR

All Urban students residing in the City of Airdrie, Town of Chestermere or Town of Cochrane are required to purchase bus passes annually. Bus pass applications will be available on our website after June 15, 2010. To ensure bus service in September, bus passes must be purchased prior to July 31, 2010. Children must have a bus pass to ride an urban bus either to or from school.
New Rural students, who are students that do not reside in the Towns of Cochrane, and Chestermere or The City of Airdrie, and did not ride during the 2009-10 school year, must register for school bus transportation. Applications will be available on our website after June 1, 2010. To ensure service in September rural applications must be submitted prior to July 31, 2010. An information letter and invoice will be mailed to rural families in late August confirming bus transportation for each child.

We encourage you to register for your annual Urban bus pass or your new Rural student online via the Transportation website at www.rockyview.ab.ca.
*If you are unable to register via the internet, you may use one of the following two options:

- Picked up at any school prior to their summer closing and submitted to the Rocky View School Division Transportation Department by mail or fax.
- Picked up directly at the Rocky View Schools, Education Centre. We accept cash, cheques, VISA, MasterCard, American Express or Debit.
- LATE APPLICATIONS WILL NOT BE GUARANTEED BUS SERVICE FOR THE FIRST FEW WEEKS OF SCHOOL OR UNTIL WE ARE ABLE TO PROCESS THE APPLICATION.
- Students attending AM or PM kindergarten will be transported one way only.
- FEES WILL NOT BE PRO-RATED FOR USING THE TRANSPORTATION SERVICE OCCASIONALLY OR FOR PART OF THE YEAR.

## Duplicate Busing

- For students accessing a school bus from more than one location to accommodate shared custody. Both parents will be invoiced for busing from each parent's location. Families must re-apply each year.


## Alternate Busing

- For students who require transportation from a location in place of their home. Families must re-apply each year.
Out of Area/Non-Resident
- For students who reside outside of the school division or for Busing students attending outside of the attendance area in which they reside. If space is available, students must access an existing stop and reapply each year with payment.
