DENSITY OF LEARNING

I remember, as a child, being assigned to write (what I believed to be worthless) reports on various subjects. It always struck me as odd that I had to put the information in my own words; the books already said it so well! At the time, I believed that writing a report on the *Battle of Marathon*, *Samuel de Champlain* or *The Economy of the USSR*, was to show my teacher that I knew about that topic. I could never understand why I had to write it all out, complete with graphs and pictures, when I could have just told the teacher that I had read the information (or even answered questions to prove my knowledge). I just couldn't understand why I should

bother taking all that time to write it out. What I didn't understand was the multiple lessons I was learning in writing that report (especially putting into my own words), something I now like to refer to as *density of learning*. When writing those reports, I did learn about the topic of the paper, but I also practiced reading for information, identifying key points, organizing information, composing sentences, building paragraphs, deciding which concepts were better explained with a picture, and, of course, the patience to complete the assignment.

Every class, every lesson, and every assign-

ment exhibits density of learning. From the simple, yet essential, skills like arriving on time, getting along with others, and taking turns, to the critical thinking that takes place when determining which character is in the right in a novel study, everything that happens at school teaches more than meets the eye. It is the density of learning taking place in every classroom that makes our 950 hours of instruction each year so valuable and assignments (even the frustrating reports in one's own words) so worthwhile.

GENEROUS GRADE THREES

The month of December was truly full of giving. The Grade 3s demonstrated this in a variety of ways. We kicked off Santa Paws month with the Grade 1s and 2s. Students generously donated many new and used toys and other needed supplies to the animal rescue crew. Demonstrating community spirit the students made gingerbread houses that were auctioned off for local families in need. We raised over \$700.

Wow! The grade 3s have also been sharing their time with lo-


POWER IN GRADE 1

LIBRARY NEWS – JANUARY 2011

Reading – Give it a Shot! is a literacy program offered to Grades 4, 5, and 6 students. This special program shows what can be done when the community works together with our schools to inspire the joy of reading!

Reading... Give it a Shot! runs from January 12 to March 14, 2011. Students record their reading time - whether it is books, newspapers, magazines, computer programs, or the Internet - on a **STUDENT TRACKING SHEET**. The student's parents, guardians or teachers can sign-off on the student's reading. After every 100 minutes read, students are rewarded with a **Calgary Flames** bookmark. Counting minutes rather than books allows all students, regardless of their reading ability, to participate. This year, a total of 24 bookmarks are available for the students to earn. The object for the students is to collect the entire Calgary Flames Set. I have ordered a set for each student in Grades 4, 5, and 6, ready to be

awarded!

Family Literacy Day across Canada is January 27, which is a Thursday this year. For more information go www.abclifeliteracy.ca. The theme this year is "Play for Literacy". Why not dust off a board game at your house and have a family game night?

Make Reading a Habit at Home

Research shows that children who read books for just 20 minutes a day perform better in school. Here are some great ways to get your child reading!

1. Set aside a reading time that is good for everyone.
2. Pick a comfortable reading place in your home.
3. Read together either by taking turns or having one person read.
4. Involve listeners by asking them questions about the story or what they think will happen

next. Engage them with varied and exciting voices.

5. Fill your home with reading materials such as magazines, newspapers, cookbooks and books.
 6. Get caught reading yourself and your child will be inspired to read as well.
 7. Have older siblings read to younger siblings to gain confidence.
 8. Start seasonal traditions. Read a favourite book every year at holidays and when they go back to school.
 9. Keep favourite books around. New readers will build confidence and fluency when re-reading a treasured book.
