HOW PEOPLE LEARN

In 1999 *The Commission on Behavioral and Social Sciences and Education* published their research findings in the aptly named book, *How People Learn: Bridging Research and Practice*. Through an examination of over 700 scholarly articles, they were able to identify three universally agreed on principles regarding the conditions in which learning can take place.

It is critical to address the preconceptions with which students come to the classroom. People start making sense of the world at a very young age. Often, we will come to incorrect conclusions and carry them with us until they are corrected.

In order to be competent in any particular field, learners must have a large body of related factual knowledge, understand how those facts fit together in the context of that field, and organize that information in such a way it can be used and re-

called. Once a person is competent in a field, he or she will start to see possibilities and make connections that are hidden for novices. For a person to be a competent reader, for instance, one must know all the sounds represented by the letters and letter combinations, the meaning of words, the structure of sentences, the implications of punctuation, and the overall context of the printed word (reading from left to right, etc.). It is only with all of this information ingrained to the level of automacy, that one is able to read and make meaning. The same is true of any field, from calculus to carpentry. Once skills, knowledge, and competence are developed, an expert in the field is able to build on that knowledge and create new, original, work.

Learners must have a clear goal of what they want to learn, why they want to

know it, and how well they are progressing in their quest for that knowledge. These skills are referred to as *metacognitive* (thinking about one's thinking) *skills*, and create the critical environment for learning to take place.

The implications of these truisms for education are obvious. Teachers must discover and correct students' pre-existing ideas before introducing new concepts. They must teach some topics in great depth in order for competence to be built and for students to be able to operate as experts surrounding those topics. Finally, students must be taught to set clear goals, both long and short term, and must learn to monitor their understanding and progress toward those goals. With these conditions met, meaningful learning can, and indeed will, take place.

TRAVELLING BACK IN TIME ON THE TITANIC

On April 15, 1912, *Titanic*, the world's largest ship, sank after colliding with an iceberg, claiming more than 1,500 lives. To incorporate Science through story telling, the Grades 2 and 3 students went to the Telus World of Science to experience the Titanic through artifacts. Upon arrival, the students were given boarding passes with the names of factual passengers that

were aboard the Titanic. Students were then led through a museum of incredible artifacts painstakingly retrieved from the depths of the Atlantic Ocean. At the end of the exhibition students could then find out if the person on their boarding pass survived or perished the day the Titanic sank. Students were very moved by the fate of these people.

It was also interesting to learn that if someone was to board this exquisite ship today, it would cost roughly \$40,000 for a first class passenger ticket. Wow!
