GRADE 1 READING COMPREHENSION

November was a busy month in Grade 1! We started learning about the plot of a story and the students are beginning to identify the characters, setting, problem and solution on their own now. Many of the stories we

read and discussed dealt with *Friendship* and what it means to be a good friend to others. We will continue to learn more reading comprehension strategies in the coming weeks, as well. It is important to practice

all of your *Lollipop Words* every day and remember to read your AR and Library books to improve reading skills even more! Great work by all the Grade 1s!

GRADES 4 AND 5 TRAVELLED BACK IN TIME

The Grades 4 and 5 classes travelled back in time when they went to Heritage Park in November. Spending a half-day in the classroom of a school from one hundred years ago made the students appreciate how fortunate they are today. Although most wanted to feel what it was like to be strapped, I suspect it

was only because it was a novelty. Most who tried to bring an authentic lunch realized that their ancestors were natural recyclers. Everything was reused. The other part of the day gave each child a feeling of the hardships pioneers had to endure. The trains set the stage for the journey out west. An actual sod

house was visited as well as a pioneer home filled with the modern conveniences of the time. The day was thoroughly enjoyed by all of us who attended.

CHEERS TO THE CAFE IN GRADE 2!

The Grade 2 students kick- started our CAFE menu system as part two of *The Daily 5* program in November. The CAFE menu board is now set up in our classroom and students enjoyed hot chocolate and reading a variety of story books to kick-off the program. CAFE is an acronym for Comprehension (I understand what I read), Accuracy (I can read the words), Fluency (I can read smoothly with few errors and I understand what I read) and Expand vocabulary (I know, find and use interesting words). As the Grade 2 students learn new strategies, they will then rename the strategy so it is meaningful to them. Individual students then put the strategies

up on the menu board and eventually they will decide which strategy they are working on based on their reading needs. Students will have individual and small group conferences with Miss Mikkelsen in order to set reading goals for themselves and follow-up on their progress. Don't forget to read with your child and check in on their progress and the strategies they are focusing on.

JUST MONKEYING AROUND

2fST CENTURY LEARNERS: INNOVATIVE PROBLEM SOLVERS

The world is changing; today's learners must be prepared for a complex society of which we do not yet have a clear vision. One of the key elements of the 21stcentury education is to develop students who will be innovative problem solvers. The word problem has many definitions and education, from mathematical word problems, to social conflicts that arise when working together in a group, to determining the most effective way to communicate information about the economic impact of the Black Death on medieval Europe.

Teaching students to solve these problems effectively requires

teaching numerous strategies. Basic comprehension is required to understand the problem, while analysis skills are needed for a deep understanding of the issue. Lateral thinking, determining many ways of addressing the issue, must also be taught. Combining elements from various ideas is another skill that is part of our modern classrooms, as is evaluating the potential effectiveness of the solutions and determining a final course of action. Once a plan for solving is developed, it must be implemented and then evaluated.

Innovation and problem solving

skills are embedded into most student assignments. From finding effective ways to communicate ideas on a variety of topics, to working together with other students, to employing technology efficiently, to looking at things from a different perspective, fosters innovation and gives students the means by which they can solve problems.

While most adults today have developed the skills over time, our students will need to have them in place as soon as they leave school. From that foundation they will need to develop more sophisticated problem-solving skills over time as our world continues to become
