## GRADE TWO MUSHERS RACE THEIR WAY TO NOME!

The excitement was on high speed this month as the Grade 2 students closely followed the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race of 2012. Students chose and cheered on their favourite musher on the 1500km trail from Anchorage to Nome, Alaska. Students learned about the sport, the history of the race and the dogs by completing research projects, reading musher blogs and watching insider videos that were uploaded daily from the trail. First place winner of the race went to Dallas Seavey, which was Ty Hetchler's musher. He is the youngest musher to ever win the Iditarod and is the third generation in his family to race. Second place went to Quentin Silvester's musher, Aliy Zirkle. The Grade 2 students celebrated the end of

the race with a classroom party, ice cream cake and prizes. We also had a special visit from Indus community members Chris and Liana Bueseker. They were nice enough to bring three of their very own sled dogs to our school for students to meet and demonstrated hooking the dogs up to their sled.

Please stay tuned in April for our upcoming Boats and Buoyancy unit in Science. Students will be designing, testing and making modifications to their own boats. Please talk with

## GREETINGS FROM THE GRADE 1 CLASSROOM!

We have had a fantastic March, and while it does not feel anywhere close to spring, I am sure it is on its way. Our class has been very excited this month corresponding with a leprechaun named Mr. Blarney. He wrote to us and encouraged the Grade 1s to try and capture him. ## **DO I HAVE A SAY IN MY EDUCATION?**

The Grade 5 students took a different approach to learning this month. Small groups were given a few pages of our recent Social Studies Chapters and had to present their information to the class. Students were excited to take responsibility for their own learning and did a wonderful job presenting and asking and responding to the question their groups had created.

After all groups had presented, they had the opportunity to give input in how they would be evaluated by themselves as well as their peers. The class learned how to create a rubric to fairly

evaluate each other's performance. Everyone had an opinion about what was important and on which skills they wanted to be graded. After we decided what they would be graded on, they learned how difficult it is to evaluate yourself fairly. Through this experience, students learned how important it is to be self-reflective, to be responsible for their own learning and how to fairly evaluate themselves and their peers.


## Servings, portions and your plate

### *Use the Healthy Plate model to divide up your meals*

A serving is an amount of food based on Canada's Food Guide. Canada's Food Guide recommends a specific number of servings from each of the four food groups depending on your age and gender.

A portion is the amount of food you may eat at one meal.

Portions of packaged and restaurant foods have increased almost five




A Healthy Plate

times in the last 20 years!

So, how do you watch your portions at mealtime? Try using the healthy plate model. Fill your plate with:

- $\frac{1}{2}$  vegetables and fruits
- $\frac{1}{4}$  grain product (choose whole grains)
- $\frac{1}{4}$  meat or alternative

Balance your meal with a glass of low-fat milk and a piece of fruit for dessert.



A glass of low fat milk provides balance for any meal.

## Some facts about HPV vaccination...

What parents of preteens/adolescents should know about the HPV vaccine...

- Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine is nearly 100-per cent protective against four types of HPV that cause 70 per cent of all cervical cancers and 90 per cent of genital warts.
- HPV vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 9 to 26.
- Provincially-funded for girls in Grade 5.
- HPV vaccine cannot cause HPV
- HPV is a highly contagious sexually transmitted infection.
- Ideally, you should get vaccinated before becoming sexually active.
- HPV is not curable once you are infected.
- HPV infects 75 per cent of people over their lifetime.
- People aged 15 to 24 have highest rates of HPV infection.
