LIVING IN A LONGHOUSE BY GRADE 5

In the month of November, the Grade 5 students studied the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Lowlands Region. During their studies, each student was asked to construct a model of the longhouse in which the Haudenosaunee and the Ouendat tribes lived. To understand how to make a longhouse, everyone needed to learn how they made them and why they were important.

What did we learn about longhouses and the people who

lived in them? The oldest woman of the Haudenosaunee tribe was called the clan mother. She was responsible for the welfare of the entire clan and their daily life. Families that are run by their mothers are matriarchal societies. Several families of the same tribe lived in one longhouse at a time. Longhouses

were always built close to their crops. Their beds were platforms along the side of the longhouse.



Under the beds they used that space for storage. Several fires went down the middle of the longhouse. They were used to dry the hides and fish that were hung in the longhouse. That is how the Ouendat and Haudenosaunee tribes lived in the longhouses.

CHEERS TO THE CAFE IN GRADE 2!

The grade 2 students kick started our CAFE menu system as part two of *The Daily 5* program in November. The *CAFE* menu board is now set up in our classroom and students enjoyed hot chocolate while reading a variety of story books to kick off the program. CAFE is an acronym for Comprehension (I understand what I read), Accuracy (I can read the words), Fluency (I can read smoothly with few errors and I understand what I read) and Expand vocabulary (I know, find and use interesting words). As a class, we put the strategies up on the menu board. Throughout the year, students will be individually working on each strategy to meet

their reading needs. Students will have individual and small group conferences with Miss Mikkelsen in order to set reading goals for themselves and follow up on their progress. Don't forget to read with your child and check in on their progress and the strategies they are focusing on. Grade 2 students also had the chance to dive in to 21st Century Learning by using Indus School's new MacBook Air cart! In the classroom, students have been exploring the basic components of our new laptops. In December,

students will start to work on their keyboarding skills.

GRADE 7 NEWS

In November the Grade 7s learned about three First Nations cultures (The Mi'kmaq, Anishinabe, and Haudenosaunee) as part of Canadian history. After researching these groups, we spent time looking at the tools

and equipment they used. Students had an opportunity to re-create one of these "ancient artifacts" to go along with a write up for his/her particular group.

The Grade 7s were both creative and enthusiastic about the project. Well done 7s!

IT'S ALL IN THE APPLICATION

Although most of us look forward to our annual Science Fair on the morning of February 7, 2013 with great excitement, there are inevitably those who ask, "What good is the scientific method? I'm not going to be a scientist."

While it is true that most students will not end up as 'scientists,' almost all will be in situations where an orderly way of thinking such as the scientific method is required. Consider the following application in the popular game, Angry Birds:

Question: How can I catapult various types of birds in such a way as to eliminate all the pigs and get a high score?

Hypothesis: If I send the black bird in a high arch, it will fall

into the gap between the stone block towers and force them outward when it explodes, leveling the buildings and eliminating the pigs. That will leave two yellow birds unused, for an additional bonus of 20,000 point.

Method: Try various angles (independent variable) to determine the correct arch to drop the bird into the gap between the buildings. Adjust based on landing locations (dependent variable) until ideal placement is achieved.

Materials: a virtual the slingshot and the black bird

Results: Numerous attempts and minor adjustments to find the correct arch to lob the black bird failed, resulting in surface explosions that caused minimal

damage. Eventually, I found the right angle and dropped the bird as desired. It exploded, knocking down all the blocks and eliminating all the pigs. Score: $46,200 + 20,000$ bonus = 66,200. Three stars awarded.

Conclusion: An angle where the leading edge of the black bird is just touching the trailing edge of the slingshot results in the correct arch to place the bird directly between the two towers, resulting the maximum damage and points from one bird.

Is the scientific method useful outside of laboratories? Three stars in every level says, "Yes!"
