If you or someone you know has a child who will turn five before February 28, 2015, that child is eligible for Kindergarten for the 2014-2015 school year. Advance registration is now available at the school between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., Monday to Thursday, and from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30

p.m. on Fridays.

Please bring a copy of the child`s birth certificate and a \$25.00 registration fee which is non-refundable.

Kindergarten is a full day program that normally runs every Tuesday and Thursday as well as on Fridays, beginning sometime in the Spring. There is no transportation charge for Kindergarten students, however, you are still required to register for bussing prior to July 31st.

I look forward to meeting many of you in the near future.


### MUSIC NOTES

### **GRADE 4 SCIENCE FAIR PROJECTS**

Many students were already proficient skaters and those who were not, quickly gained new skills each day. I, on the other hand, seemed to improve only slightly. This experience reminded me of how challenging it may be for many of our students to acquire the new skills they are faced with daily.

We no sooner finished skating when it was time to get serious with putting the Science Fair Projects together. I was very impressed with a lot of the students' project ideas. Each project was as unique, as the child behind the scenes of the crea-

tion. Setting up the necessary scientific information on a huge trifold was challenging, but I sensed the pride that each student felt standing by



their project the day of the fair. I believe it gave each of them a sense of how putting forth your best effort is worth it. Grade 4 is young to be able to do this level of work, but it will give Skating and Science Fair Projects required much parent support. I greatly appreciate your assistance, but even more importantly the active interest you are taking in your child's education.
