

This month we have some very special guests coming into our classroom to help our Social Studies learning come alive! Currently we are studying the Ukraine. We will be making some yummy authentic Ukranian perogies and, in preparation for our fast-approaching Easter, Ukranian Easter eggs!

We made perogies during the afternoon of March 23^{rd.} Students will measure the ingredients and will help to roll out, stuff, and pinch the perogies. We will also get to taste some! Numbers and Words

Over the last 6 weeks we have been practicing our number skills in the Think Tank. Some of the students have been working with word problems. They are looking for Key Words, embedded in the word problem, to help them figure out which operation to use. Words like "how much", "in total" and "altogether" give us the hint that we need to use addition to find the solution. Meanwhile, words such as "fewer", "difference" and "remain" suggest we need to use subtraction. What words might we look for in a word problem that requires the use of multiplication or division? Take a look at our Key Word poster below to find out.

In September, we learned about Terry Fox, the young hero who left behind a huge legacy! This month we learned that there are many heroes that live among us! As we discover our own unique identity, our special talents and interests, we recognize how we interact with others with whom we have connections and how we fit into the world. Our family is our first and key support system when we are young, but gradually we develop new connections and feel a sense of belonging with other groups such as the Indus Kindergarten and school, sports teams and the community!

Who are the special helpers that keep us safe in our community? This month after role-playing in our classroom fire station, we had the opportunity to meet some of these heroes in person! We visited the McKenzie Towne Fire Station and the fire fighters allowed us to explore and experience not only their trucks and ambulances, but they demonstrated how their specially designed equipment assists them in rescuing people. The thermal imaging camera is used to locate individuals in a fire where one is unable to see due to the thick smoke and the "Jaws of Life" are used to free people trapped in a vehicle after a crash. We tried out the fire fighters' heavy gear and learned that seconds can save lives so firemen prepare for a quick exit including using the fire pole to reach the fire trucks. A special thanks goes out to the wonderful volunteers who made this field trip possible!

We look forward to visits from other community helpers later this year.

First Student Busing: Permissible & Non-Permissible Items to Transport

Permissible:

Band Equipment 1) Must be in a case which can be held on the student's lap, or fit under the seat of the school bus.

2) Case dimensions **cannot exceed** the following; 32" or 81cm long / 14" or 35cm wide / 11.5" or 29cm tall (Tubas, Sousaphones, Bass Saxophones, Tympanis, Trombones, and Drums are non-permissible instruments as they cannot be carried in a case.)

Ice Skates, Roller Skates, Volleyballs, Soccer Balls, and Basketballs must be in a canvas zippered sports bag. Plastic, paper, or cloth grocery bags are unacceptable for the transport of the above items.

Non-Permissible:

Skate Boards, Hockey/Ringette Sticks, Golf Clubs, Skis, Ski Poles, Snowboards, Lacrosse Sticks, Laser Pens, Oversized Band Instruments, Large Homework Projects, and Large Shop Projects are all not permitted on the school bus.

Rocky View School Division Busing Information

Student Code of Conduct

Bus safety is the responsibility of the bus driver, school bus passengers and their parents. Parents and students are asked to be familiar and supportive with Rocky View's Student Code of Conduct by:

- 1) Following the instructions of the bus driver at all times.

 He/she is in full charge of the bus and responsible for your safety.
- 2) Being considerate of other passengers and the bus driver.

 Mutual consideration creates a pleasant atmosphere on the bus. There is zero tolerance of personal harassment of bus drivers or other passengers.

 Harassment is any behavior that denies individuals their dignity and respect.
- 3) Having respect for the bus and its contents.

 Parents/students will be expected to pay for damage caused by the student.
- 4) Sitting squarely in the seat, facing forward. Keep head, limbs and objects inside the bus and out of the bus aisle.

This is the safest way to travel on a school bus and may prevent serious injury.

- 5) Keeping noise on the bus to a minimum.

 Loud noises or shouting are dangerously distracting to the driver.
- 6) Arriving at the bus stop prior to the scheduled pick up time.

 If passengers are punctual the bus driver is able to maintain a schedule and students will arrive at school on time.

While being transported on a school bus, students are prohibited from carrying laser pens, matches or lighters, drugs, alcohol, weapons of any kind, fuel or any other items that may pose a threat to the passengers on the bus

The bus driver or Rocky View's Transportation Department will contact parents if a problem arises with a child. If the problem is not resolved and the inappropriate behavior continues Misconduct Reports will be filed with the school administrator. This process may be by-passed when a serious problem occurs requiring immediate attention. In such a situation, the school administrator will notify parents. In a case when a student's bus privileges have been suspended, parents become responsible for the transportation of the suspended student to and from school. School Volunteers

Volunteers can make a significant difference in children's educations. In addition to facilitating activities that would otherwise not be possible or practical, their presence in the school shows children that they value education and are working to help make it as enriching as possible. Indus School places an extremely high value on volunteers, and encourages it wherever and whenever possible. That being said, there are several rules and regulations that pertain to volunteers.

Role: Volunteer – a volunteer supports a classroom or school-wide program under the direct supervision and responsibility of a staff member and the ultimate responsibility and supervision of the principal.

As per Rocky View Schools Policy GBCD-Mandatory Record Checks, all volunteers will complete and submit a *Criminal Record Check* and a *Vulnerable Sector Check*, the results of which are deemed acceptable to the principal, prior to working with students. These checks are valid for one year, but may be extended by one year, to up to five years, by signing a declaration form at the beginning of each school year. If driving is involved, the volunteer must also submit a Driver's Abstract (available at Registry offices) and proof of \$2,000,000 liability insurance.

Expectations for Volunteers: It is important to remember that the purpose of volunteers is to support the teacher as he or she conducts regular or special programming, or to support the coordinator of another programming that may involve more than one class. It is vital to recognize that the volunteer is, unless directed otherwise by the teacher or coordinator, working with multiple students, not just his or her child. The activities for which volunteers are sought are *school* activities; we ask that those wishing to experience these trips as a *family* to please do so at another time.

Specific to this, unless directed otherwise by the teacher:

- A) Volunteers should model positive behavior by adhering to the same behavior expectations as students (e.g. not standing on busses, not using vending machines if vending machines are not to be used by students, following safety procedures, etc.)
- B) Volunteers must treat all students equally and respectfully. Volunteers must avoid providing or soliciting special treatment for one student or a small group of students.
- C) Volunteers must support positive behavior without taking on a disciplinary role. While reminding excited students about expectations is an important part of a volunteer's job, any significant behavior issues should be brought to the attention of the teacher or supervising staff member, who will address them.

Volunteers are asked not to bring younger siblings when volunteering. One of the goals of special activities is to improve relationships between students within a class. Adding new children to the mix not only reduces the volunteer's effectiveness as a supervisor, but also changes the inter-student dynamics, making the aforementioned relationship solidification more difficult. Further, most venues for field trips require a specific adult:child ratio; extra children change the ratio, thus requiring more supervisors. During some events (particularly those held at the school), babysitters may be provided by the school. Please check with the activity organizer as this is done on an event-by-event basis.

There has been discussion regarding a babysitting coop; please contact Michelle Alm, Chair of the Indus School Council, if you might be interested in such a venture. We hope this clarifies expectations for volunteers, and hope to see you soon!

But I Don't Have Any Homework.....



How many times have you been met with this answer? Surely your child must have work they need to do, at least a couple of times a week? Nope... they insist they have nothing. Although they might be right about not having specific "homework," there is always review and study to be done.

Review is "the process of going over a subject again in study or recitation in order to fix it in the memory or summarize the facts." Unfortunately, many students find the idea of reviewing as onerous and too time consuming. Without consistent support and reinforcement, many students will not see the importance of this building these skills. There are many strategies used to help students develop these competencies. Studying and review are skills, and as with any skill, they will only develop with individual buy-in and practice.

Below are the important concepts we are exploring in Division 3:

Individual learning styles – Students must understand who they are as a learner. Knowing this will help them determine how they best learn and what styles of activities best fit for studying. They may find themselves to be more of a visual, auditory or kinesthetic learner, or a combination of all three. Using graphic organizers, note taking formats and partner study strategies are often practiced to help students build skills that fit with their learning styles. Many other strategies are explored throughout the middle school years. Time management – Effective study skills are more than the things students learned at school. It is necessary to look at all aspects of a student's life, even time outside of school. Many students are involved in a number of different activities. It is important for middle school students to build balance into their lives. Using organizing tools such as calendars or phone aps are sometimes useful. Similar to adults, organized lives help maintain balance. Balance allows review time to be more easily built into a student's schedule. Student responsibility and buy in – Teachers and parents work very hard to emphasize the importance of regular review and study. We often use analogies of riding a bike or throwing a healing rope, trying to "hook" our kids into being studiers. We have the advantage of hindsight and experience. Many of us wish we had done more review or could manage our time more effectively. Many students are caught up in the idea of instant gratification and struggle to see long-term goals and the benefits of consistent study and review. Without student buy-in, it is difficult to build and use study skills effectively. Many students will not see the importance until they reach high school, or often beyond.

As a middle school teacher, I will continue to work with students to explore and build positive habits around review and study. Some students will get it; others will continue to respond to our questions with, "No, I don't have any homework." Eventually, most will discover that to be the best you can at anything, review and practice is necessary. Hopefully, they will recognize how it all ties into success in the "real" world.

So, the next time your middle or high school child says, "I have no homework," ask them if they have some review they can do.






