
MISSION STATEMENT:

WE DAY: Goat Fundraiser an Amazing Success!!!

Indus School's 2014 Me to We Group chose to support the Year of Empowerment, an initiative of Free The Children, by raising money to send goats to families in Ecuador. The gift of a goat helps break the cycle of poverty because the families are able to make an income from selling the milk, and can breed their goat to raise a herd! This income allows families to buy medical and school supplies for their children. One goat costs \$50.00.

Mrs. McKenzie and her Me to We group, held various fundraisers including Fun Fairs, Dances, Face Painting, Karaoke and Bake Sales, where students donated money to attend. Our initial goal was to raise 13 goats, but students, staff and parents overcame that goal in only one week! So, we set a new goal of 30 goats! Staff agreed to motivate students by putting themselves through some torture. We had an assembly on February 12th, where students were able to witness the staff paying their dues.



This entire fundraiser has brought on a new spirit at Indus School. The students have been ecstatic about the teacher torture and about raising money outside of school for this great cause. When Mrs. McKenzie announced the events that would take place if enough money was raised, students could hardly contain their excitement! Live goats were brought to our school for students to pet and ever since then, there has been a constant rumble about goats in our hallways. We have kept track of the number of goats we have raised on a giant poster outside the office. Students are always checking on it as they get a drink or go to the bathroom. They are excited as more goats get coloured in, especially because the teacher torture is also noted on the poster. Families and staff have even donated money towards an entire goat! As a school community, we raised a total of 42 goats, which is \$2100.00.

At the assembly Mrs. McKenzie allowed students to duct tape her to the wall. She was able to stick and raised enough money for three goats. Students were also very excited to watch Mr. Green shave his beard, Mrs. Neid and Mrs. Sefton wear Sumo Suits, and Mrs. Ischenko play a duet on the recorder through her nostrils. It was fantastic! Mrs. Beal blew us away with her beautiful voice and sang the national anthem A Capella. Students and staff could not contain their laughter when Mr. Wyper sang a love song to a pig and kissed it. Also that day, Mr. Wyper, Mrs. Preete, Mrs. Neid, Mrs. Beal and Ms. Allard took the plunge and had a bucket of ice dumped on their head. Thank you to all staff, parents and students for your wonderful spirit and support. We are all blown away with the enthusiasm at Indus!

School Lunches

Is it time to try something new for lunch?

Involve your kids.

Let your child choose the foods they like.
 This will increase the chance of them eating the foods you send.

Switch up bread options.

 Try using whole grain wraps, pitas, small bagels, English muffins, buns or a different type of bread.

Add excitement to vegetables and fruit.

 Send fruit such as bananas, pineapple or apples with a yogurt dip or vegetables like carrots, cucumbers or celery with hummus dip. Keep in mind; kids are more likely to eat vegetables and fruit that are already cut up!

Offer a variety of meat and meat alternatives.

 Use leftover meat from supper or make a homemade egg salad mixture for sandwiches.

Include milk and milk alternatives.

 Have a carton or container of milk with lunch. Add cheese to your child's sandwich or some yogurt to round out the meal.

Aim to include a food choice from each of the four food groups on <u>Canada's Food</u>
<u>Guide</u> (Vegetables and Fruit, Grain Products, Milk and Alternatives and Meat and
Alternatives) to make a balanced and healthy meal.




Grade Two: Finishing up Western Canada!



Although February was a short month, it was not short on excitement. The month began with a visit by a couple of goats for our WE Day Charity. Students were then invited to a Jelly Bean Dance and Fun Activities during recess times to raise money.

The month ended with Science Fair and Valentine celebrations. In the midst of WE DAY fundraising, the students realized it was time to get serious with putting the Science Fair Projects together. I was very impressed with a lot of the students' project ideas. Each project was as unique as the child behind the scenes of the creation. Setting up the necessary scientific information on a huge trifold was challenging, but I sensed the pride that each student felt standing by their project the day of the fair. I believe it gave each of them a sense of how putting forth your best effort is worth it. Grade 4 is young to be able to do this level of work, but it will give each student a huge advantage when they are able to compete competitively next year. The Grade 5 students were able to provide guidance since it was now their second year. For Grade 5, it was the first time they could choose to enter their project in the competitive category. With this decision, the students had to face judges and their questions. This choice takes a lot of courage and just entering this category needs to be congratulated. Science Fair Projects required much parent support. I greatly appreciate your assistance, but even more importantly the active interest you are taking in your child's education.





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Grade 3: Shaking Things Up!


Grade 3 was rocking and rolling during the week of February 9th. Mr. Wyper built us a special Earthquake simulating machine to test the structures that we built for Science! The machine simulated p-waves and s-waves and shook our structures like crazy! It was exciting for all students to be able to help clamp their structures down and then press the button to operate the drill that shook them. We are proud to say that almost all of the structures stayed intact. This taught us that strong joints are crucial to the stability of our buildings and that choosing our materials carefully when building specific types of structures is a must. After the earthquake, a short hurricane came through to further test each of the projects. Again, almost every structure was able to survive this wind and water test. I am proud of all of the Grade 3s for the thoughtful and diligent work that they put in to their projects! Excellent job, Grade 3! Thanks again to Mr. Wyper for helping make our Science structure testing so exciting.





Missing In Division 3

The students of Division 3 are currently involved in seeking out bodies of indeterminate value through the manipulation of alphanumeric sequences. Simply, we are looking for x. Grades 7, 8 and 9 are exploring linear relations and their related functions. Graphing, table creation and solving for unknown variables are being worked on in all grades, with Grade 9 going much deeper with studies of linear inequalities and polynomials.



Life Skill Learning

Division 3 Life Skill students spent the last few classes before break learning about the basics of first aid. We were lucky enough to have Marsha Nelson show us some of the techniques for wrapping sprains and dealing with bleeding. Hands-on practice as the "first on the scene" person and the victim was both fun and informative. Students were given opportunities to try new things and ask questions about sprains and bleeding. Christine Nunn gave us another great learning opportunity, bringing in CPR Manikins. Students quickly found that maintaining proper chest compressions for an extended period of time was much harder than they thought. Although students did not receive formal certification, the hands-on practice helped them gain basic knowledge and confidence that may help them in future situations.

Again, we would like to thank Marsha Nelson, Christine Nunn and the other parents who offered their assistance and knowledge for this option course.

We have had a very pink/red month. Lots of dressing up for "Soft Heart" month. All month students could have a stuffy with them throughout their morning class. The stuffies can be a self-regulating tool as it can help many students to think calmly. The stuffies helped the students to role play or act out how some people can be mean and how some people become bullies. More importantly, we acted out with the stuffies how we can change the bully cycle and 'stand up' for ourselves and others.

We have been acquiring objects/pictures for our Team 2/3 poster. These are things that make us happy or confident. When we look up at the poster we remind ourselves we can handle the next challenge. This poster will remain in the room all day and throughout the rest of the year. This will identify this room as Team 2/3s room. We are putting our stamp on this learning space and trying to be humourous when we call this – our "stink poster" with our "stink things".



Team 2/3: Splash Math



It looks like they may be playing Lego. What we are doing is learning to know a small number of things without the need to count them one by one.

Imagine you are driving to Banff and see a number of deer by the side of the road. Going 120 kilometers an hour (*oops*) do you have time to count one by one or do you see 3 by the fence, 2 in the ditch and 4 under that big tree, making 9. If you try to count one by one, you are gone in a flash and can only say, "saw some deer."

This skill cements for students the value behind the symbol.

In Splash Math, we start with 10 blocks or small items like Lego. Splash down or let go of some of the blocks. Allow the student 2 seconds to see and quickly cover them up. The student tells you how many were seen. Uncover to check. The student's job is to see and know – they strive not to count one by one but to see the number. As the student becomes proficient, we add more blocks. The skill to see clusters or groups and to then add these groups together extends the mental math knowledge making number ever more real.

Great game – give it a try!

Current Tech Creates Historical Tech

Getting lost is difficult in this day of GPS, but it was not always so. A thousand years ago, the astrolabe (precursor to the sextant), was cutting edge navigational technology. It gave the viewer an accurate reading of the angle of the sun or a star above the horizon.

As part of the Grade 9 unit on Space Technology, Mr. Green, with a lot of help from Rhyse in Grade 8, used our 3D printer to create an astrolabe. The students will now be able to see and touch the historical device, rather than just reading about it in a textbook.
